Regulation of Water Utilities

- Municipal Water Systems most have opted out of IURC regulation
- For Profit Water Utilities all are regulated by the IURC
- Non-Profit Water Utilities most have withdrawn from IURC jurisdiction
- Water Authorities –hybrid utility; most are regulated by IURC, but have legal authority to withdraw
- Regional Water Districts not regulated by the IURC
- Conservancy Districts most are regulated by the IURC



Regionalization

- SRF Program grants priority and funding for regionalization projects
- New legislation allowing for expedited approval of a limited jurisdiction over acquisition of smaller utilities by larger utilities
- Anti-Degradation for sewer



Water Rates and Charges

- Wholesale Water Rates
- Retail Rates
- If not regulated by the IURC, then any disputes go to the trial court
- In either case, rates must be cost-based and courts have recently ruled that automatic CPI adjustments not tied to actual costs for a given utility are unlawful
- Rate-making bible: AWWA M1 Manual



Territorial Disputes for Water Utilities

- First come, first serve: race state
- Three exceptions
 - Municipal water ordinances
 - 7 USC § 1926
 - Regional districts



Regulation of Water Supply

- Town of Avon v. West Central Conservancy District, 957 N.E.2d 598 (Ind.2011)
- 2012 Law changed court ruling in Avon; granted power to regulate to Department of Natural Resources
- Southern Indiana Model
- Tippecanoe County Dispute
- Indiana General Assembly
