The H2Ohio initiative is Governor DeWine's long-term investment toward water quality improvements for future generations in Ohio.



\$60.7M

per year to support and research best management practices in the Western Lake Erie Basin and expand H2Ohio practices statewide to encompass 500,000 new acres of farmland.

Ohio Department of Natural Resources

\$46.6M

per year for continued investment into natural infrastructure through the creation, restoration, and enhancement of wetlands that filter harmful nutrients out of Ohio waterways that can cause harmful algal blooms. The funding would restore an estimated additional 4,800 acres of wetland and associated habitat and filter 33,000 additional acres of watershed each year.







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Ohio Environmental Protection Agency

\$27.5M

per year to improve the quality of life for Ohioans by ensuring safe drinking water and protecting public health. This funding will be awarded as grants to underserved communities for water and wastewater infrastructure projects and technical support.

H2Ohio Rivers Initiative

\$46.6M

per year, included in the agencies' funding totals, for the new H2Ohio Rivers Initiative.

Ohio Lake Erie Commission

\$131,250

per year to continue funding accountability tools to evaluate H2Ohio efforts.
