



Mainstem








Ecosystem Services Value—\$50B/year






Geographic Ecological Restoration Funding (Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act)

 - 2. Economic Development
 - 3. Public Health

Percentage Who Call the Threat "Very Serious" or "Somewhat Serious"

	Republicans	Democrats	Independents
Sewage contamination	81%	84%	81%
Toxic pollution like PCBs and mercury	80%	84%	77%
Loss of wetlands and habitat	75%	81%	78%
Flooding	76%	81%	76%
Agricultural runoff	72%	80%	70%
Non-native species like invasive carp	68%	74%	66%

Ohio River Restoration Program Act

(H.R. 10432 https://www.congress.gov/bill/118th-congress/house-bill/10432)



Learning that there is "a plan to commit government resources to improve the condition of local waters and the Ohio River," the Basin's voters support it *overwhelmingly*, with 74% in support and only 7% opposed – *a ten-to-one margin*.

- This support is strongly bipartisan, with 74% of Republicans, 84% of Democrats, and 69% of Independent voters across the Basin supporting the concept of a plan.
- Support for the plan is remarkably consistent no matter where voters live, never dropping below 73% in any state within the Basin.
